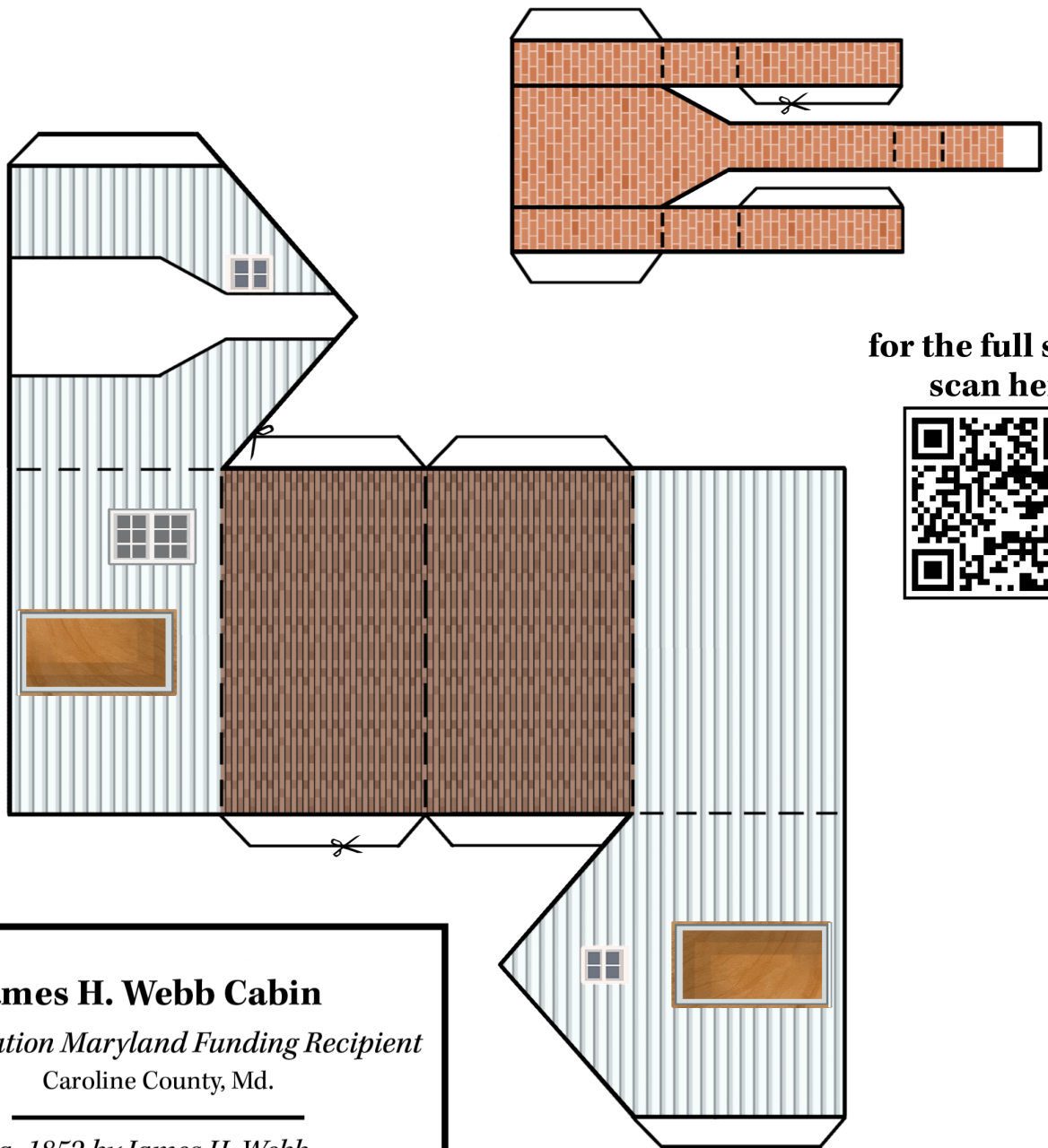


Building Communities: Telling Maryland's Story Through Historic Architecture

The cabin housed the free Black man, James H. Webb and his recently freed wife, Mary Ann, along with other family members. The original foundation of the house remains, with the rest having been reconstructed. It is the only remaining house on the Eastern Shore built by a free Black person before the Civil War. The Webb Cabin is owned and maintained by the Caroline Historical Society, and is one of more than 30 sites on the Harriet Tubman Underground Railroad Byway.

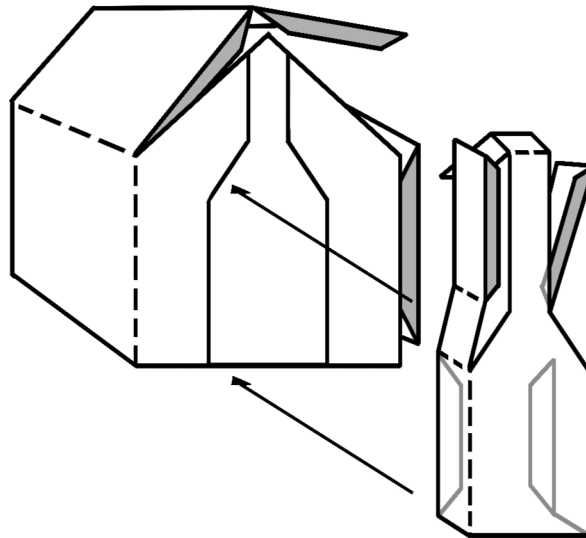
