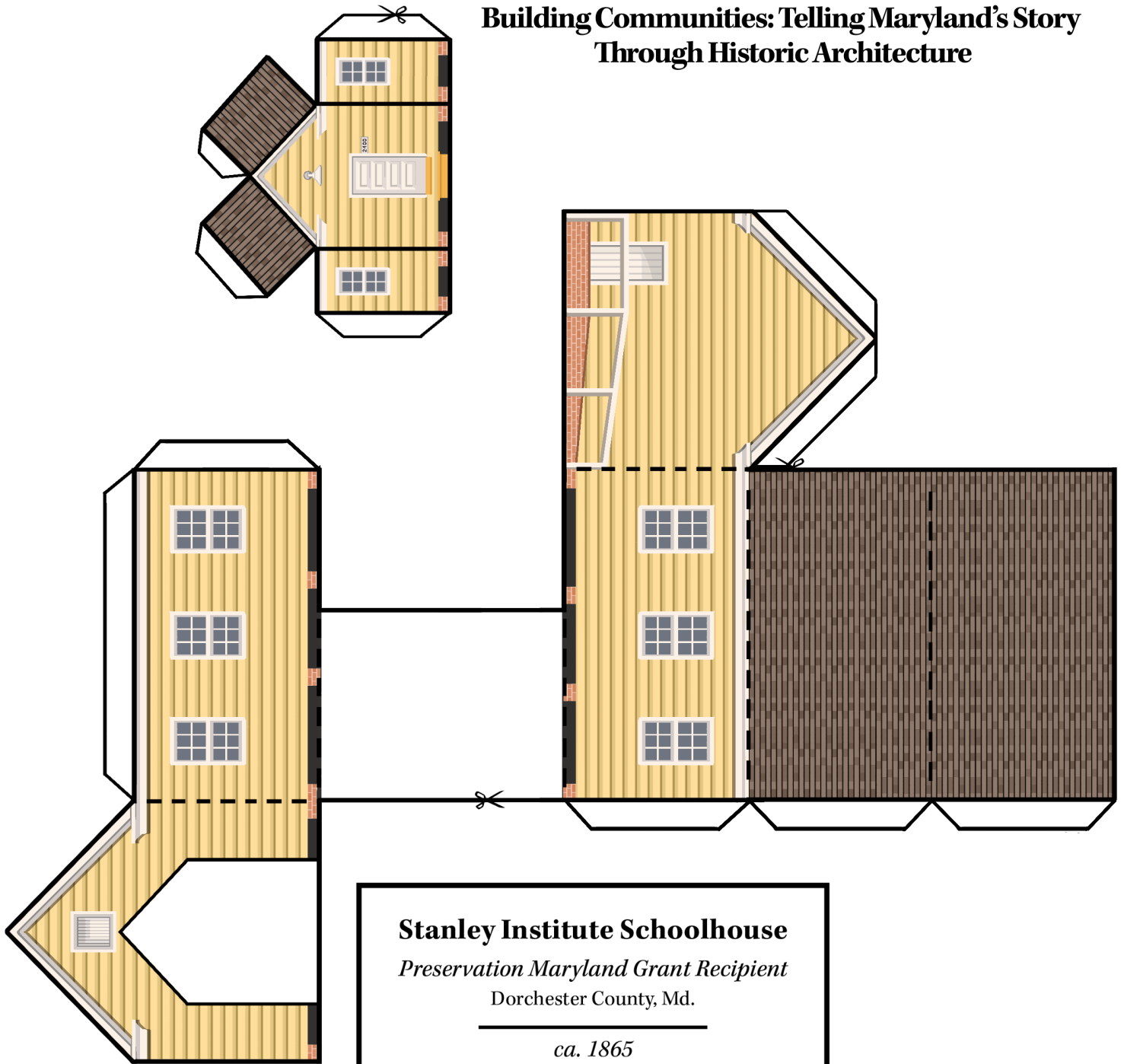


Building Communities: Telling Maryland's Story Through Historic Architecture

The Stanley Institute, previously called the Rock School, is an early post-Civil War African-American school built and run independently by the local Black community. It was used as a schoolhouse until 1966, and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Today it is the 7th stop on the Harriet Tubman Byway, a self-guided driving tour that covers 45 sites related to the Underground Railroad.

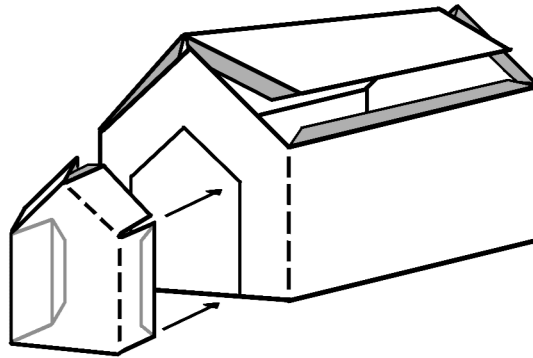
