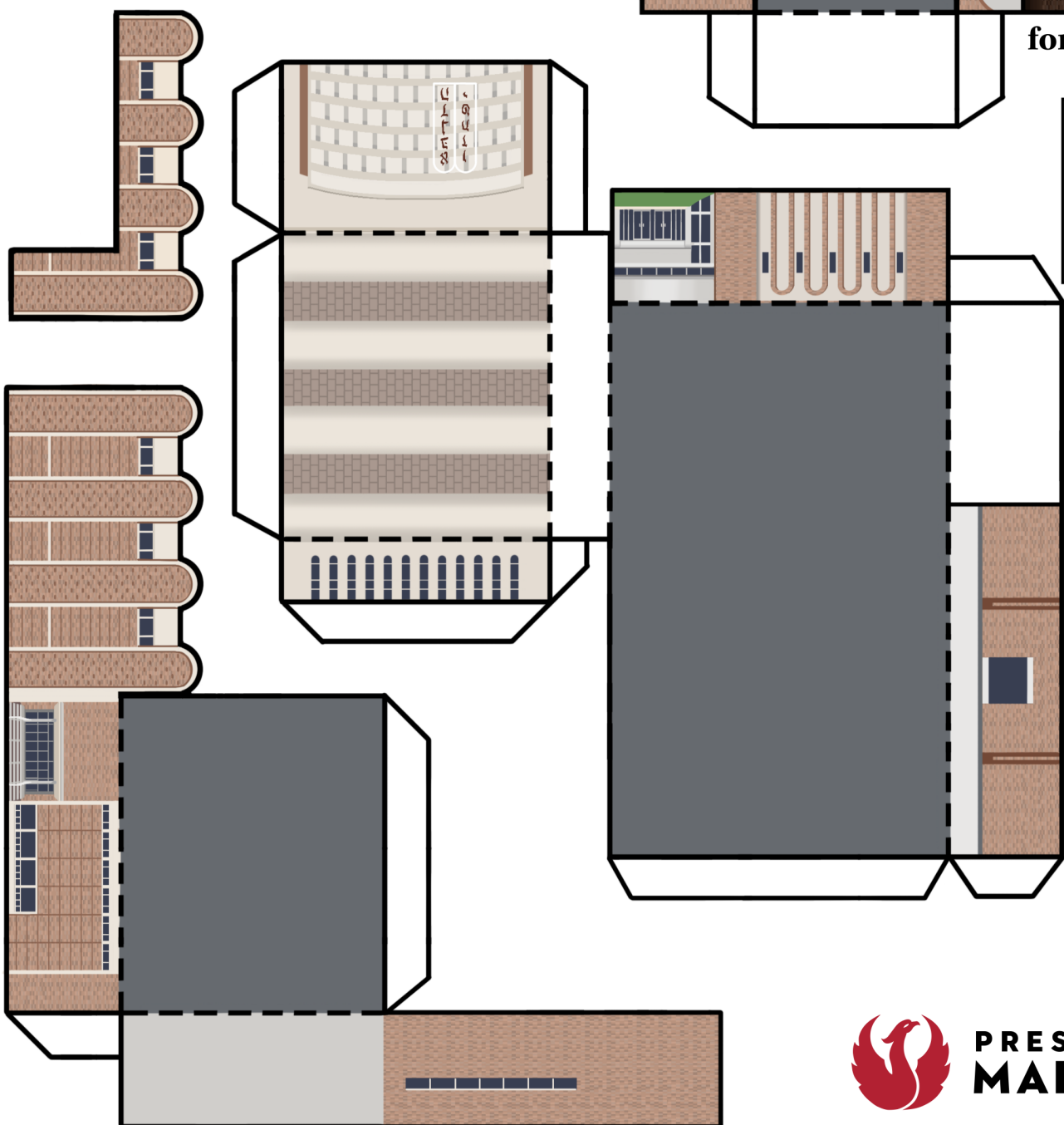


Building Communities: Telling Maryland's Story Through Historic Architecture

Its modern sanctuary, completed in 1956, reflects evolving religious architecture and the growth of Baltimore's Jewish community, while preservation of the congregation's historic legacy highlights the cultural diversity that shaped Maryland communities.

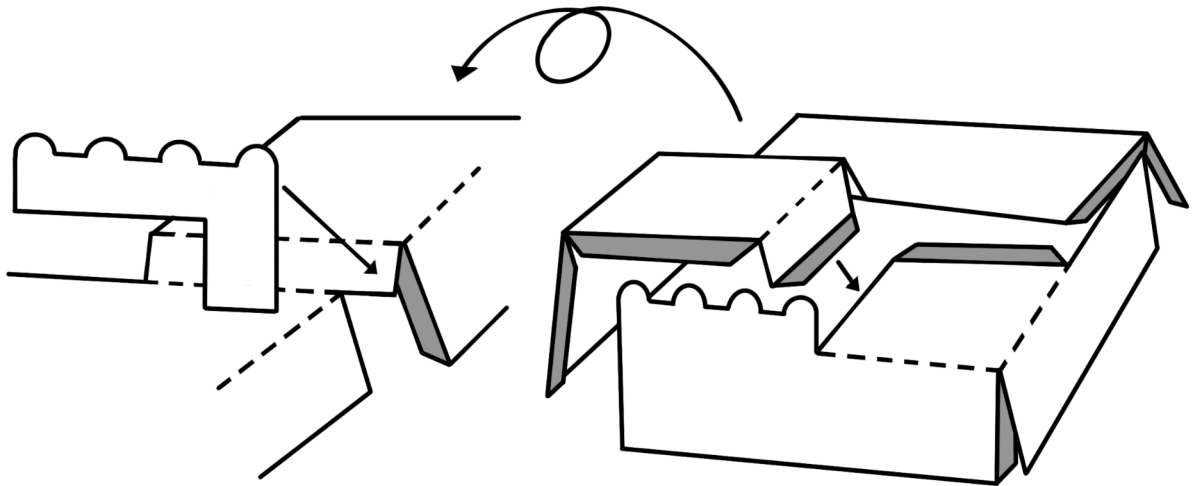
